Aside from his religious activities he vas always to the front in every movement for the betterment of the city or community and at the time of was secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, in which position he came nearer measuring up to the requirments as an all around man than any one that has heretofore filled the office-in short he was by long dds the best secretary Chamber of Commerce of Poteau has ever had. He stood high in the ranks, if not the foremost worker the town and the county had in the late warthe most grewsome in all historyand it was never too early or too
